PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Ones.

My message this month is from the Saturday issue of the Daytona News-Journal written as follows...

People often ask me why ON EARTH anyone would want to read the Bible. They think it is nice, heartwarming and inspiring, even, that their pastor would talk about the Bible on Sunday...they like memorizing favorite passages, but that is not the same as expecting that they would read Scripture... regularly even. Why should anyone? Would anyone? I mean, regular, non-fanatic people... would regular people read the whole Bible? Would any sane person read it more than once? Over three years ago, in this paper, I shared what a gift and learning experience it has been for me to continually reread the One Year Bible, a practice I began as a young mother before I entered ministry and have maintained for over thirty years.

The Old Testament, infamous for the violence of God's people and the harshness of God's apparent Self, reveals... especially with slogging all the way through, often... that God is at work trying to get through with a radical new message of connection and loving justice... the kind of justice that ensures the poor and the alien are fed. There are surprising plot twists in the Old Testament that overturn our conclusions about who is excluded and pave the way for God's purpose of healing and hope. For example, Deuteronomy 23:3 warns that no Moabite should be permitted in the Lord's assembly even to the tenth generation! But in the book of Ruth there is sweet Ruth (the Moabite) welcomed in, made a part of the assembly. Later her great grandson becomes King David, God's beloved. Furthermore, if we are really paying attention we see that Ruth's second husband, the great grandfather of King David, was the son of a prostitute... another foreigner... who helped the Hebrew people win the battle of Jericho!

Ruth and her husband's mother, Rahab, are both listed in Matthew's genealogy of Jesus. The third woman mentioned in Jesus' lineage is Tamar, a Canaanite... another foreigner. God's holy purpose of healing and hope clearly moves through including the previously excluded. Reading all the Bible multiple times brings this message of inclusion home to us.

Deuteronomy also forbids men who have been emasculated from entering the Lord's assembly, but in Acts 8:26-40, the disciple Philip is drawn to an Ethiopian eunuch by the Holy Spirit. The eunuch sees in his victimization echoes of Jesus' own and Philip helps him see the infinite love God extends and baptizes him on the spot. Another foreigner, previously doubly excluded (due to his emasculation and lineage), drawn into the people of God! What can these plot twists teach us about God's call to meet with compassion the resident aliens in our country? Additionally, as we see black men arrested for sitting peacefully in a Starbucks, how might the knowledge that the Ethiopian was a convert to the early Christian church *through God's direct intervention* shape our thinking? The Holy Spirit called to Philip to the Ethiopian. Surely folks who read Scripture can feel a similar pull to value the sacred worth of our darker skinned brothers and sisters?

A little boy in a clergy friend's office looked at a long shelf of Bibles. My friend was proud of his collection of different translations. "Are these all your Bibles?" the kid asked. "Yes," my friend answered, proudly. "You only need one, if you read it," said the kid. Sigh...good point.

These days folks are frequently better at Bible thumping than Bible reading. Scripture invites us into a relationship with God and one another where we do not get to decide that one person is "worth" more than another because God's purpose inevitably involves plot twists. Who would we leave out? Would we send Mary back into the kitchen? Jesus wouldn't. Foreigners? Jesus came to us through foreigners...people who Scripture said, at one point, should be kept away! Love your neighbor as yourself is in Leviticus 19 as well as in Mark 12... God really means this! What about those who work hard versus those we would label "lazy"? Remember the story Jesus told about paying laborers? The employer in Jesus' story ensured that the ones who worked all day would see that they were paid *the same* as the ones who only got working for the last little bit! How might this inform our understanding of the importance of a living wage for all workers? The story of the prodigal son... the story of the "good Samaritan" (spoken at a time when there were, supposedly, **no** *good* Samaritans!). God draws us into community through plot twists that change everything.

This Sunday our church is celebrating SEVEN YEARS of being "open and affirming". That means for **seven years** we have practiced our understanding that God calls us to love and work beside, to include, affirm (and marry when they have fallen in love and want this commitment) our gay neighbors as much as we love, include, affirm and perform marriages for those of us who are attracted to different sex partners. We are all God's children, and reading the Bible, we learn to thump on it less and weave the plot twists into our journey.

April 11, 2018 meeting

Meeting opened with prayer by Chair Vern Whittenburg at 6 p.m.

OLD BUSINESS:

HOLY WEEK REVIEW

The committee discussed and reviewed Holy Week services and events. All agreed the new approach this year to decorating the chancel with flowers (members buying their own) made for a beautiful floral display of color. People also loved placing the cut flowers on the cross and seeing it blossom into Easter colors. The committee did agree to go back to distributing the palm crosses. The palm spears didn't hold up too well and it took time for the ushers to separate the strands.

CHOIR SEATING

The committee also was pleased with the new choir seating and chair covers, and shared positive feedback from some folks in the congregation. We still need to figure out a way to cover the back of the sound system so the wires don't show. Greg will look into what can be used.

COMMUNION LINENS

Vern sent an email to the congregation seeking someone to handle cleaning the Communion linens and ensuring they are pressed, folded and returned to the sanctuary on a regular basis. No one responded. Vern will try the personal approach.

Pastor Diane asked everyone to remember that the embroidered linens are preferred for Communion. The plain white ones are to be used only when absolutely necessary.

NEW BUSINESS:

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Several committee members reported hearing from the congregation that they would like us to go back to making announcements. The requests also have been coming from people who have something to announce. The committee, however, did recognize that our Praise Music is also a big hit with the congregation. The committee decided that in May we would start out with just a few Praise Hymns, followed by brief announcements and move into a choral or piano introit as chosen by Music Director Cindy Gardner. Vern will write an article for the Voice detailing the procedure for the congregation to get him announcements.

SANCTUARY WIFI

Greg will look into why the wifi in the sanctuary is not working.

SOUND/ELECTRONICS

Greg will look into getting a better lapel mic for Pastor Diane, but first we must find the old headsets (black and tan) because we will be able to use receiver from one of them, thereby saving additional/needless expense. Greg also will talk with Property committee about installing a shelf on the wall for the receivers that are currently stacked on books and each other on a wobbly table.

There was some discussion on moving the entire sound system to the back of the church, which is the optimum (and usual) place to locate it. Greg said the expense of moving all the wires to the back of the sanctuary was the reason it wasn't done when we put in the new system. He agreed to find out how much it would cost now.

ADDITIONAL WHEELCHAIR SEATING

Committee members noticed a need for additional wheelchair seating in the sanctuary. Since the pews were moved off the chancel, we do have another short pew that could replace a long pew in the sanctuary to provide the needed space. It was suggested to replace the long pew with the short one directly across from the wheelchair seating area we already have. Vern will look into getting that done.

FOOD DRIVE! VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive" is Saturday, May 12. This will be the 26th year nationwide. The Letter Carrier Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive is the outgrowth of a tradition of community service exhibited by members of the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC) over the last 125 years.

Each year, groups, businesses and organizations join the letter carriers at the local, regional and national levels to help grow a campaign of hunger awareness and community action in conducting this one-day, record-making food drive. Locally, the letter carriers' Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive enjoys partnerships with many church and faith groups, Gifts of Love Community Coalition is one of the receivers of this totally awesome project. In 2017, we celebrated Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive's 25th anniversary, and branches all across the United States collected more than 75 million pounds of food for a cumulative total of approximately 1.6 billion pounds over the history of the drive — an awesome achievement. Oh, and in Edgewater and New Smyrna Beach it absolutely poured like it was monsoon season. Let's hope for awesome weather this season.

What this means locally is it will help fill the food pantries when the demand for food rises due to schools being out. All through the summer when our clients come to receive food we provide a "fun" snack pack for each child in the family. We also need to remember our seniors, our children and our infants.

Currently, 49 million Americans — about one in six — are unsure where their next meal is coming from, including 13 million children and more than 5 million older than 60.

Food banks and pantries often receive the bulk of donations during Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons. By springtime, many pantries are depleted, entering the summer low on supplies at a time when many school breakfast and lunch programs are not available to children in need.

To participate, leave a nonperishable food donation in a bag by the mailbox Saturday, May 12, and the letter carrier or another volunteer will ensure that donation gets to the pantry.
